

## Guidelines for Solicitors and Medical Experts in Preparing Screening Reports in Clinical Negligence Cases

1. Screening Reports may be required in the following circumstances:

To apply for Community Legal Service funding

To provide an initial report for a privately funded client

To advise a conditional fee insurer

To advise a legal expenses insurer

To satisfy the Legal Services Commission on a subsidiary issue of negligence or causation where funding has been granted to obtain an experts' preliminary opinion, eg reporting on

histopathology slides, X-rays/scans.

- 2. The remit of the Screening Report is to highlight/narrow down the medical issues and summarise the strengths and weaknesses of a potential case.
- 3. The solicitor must contact the expert prior to instruction to confirm the availability of the expert and should agree, with the expert, when instructions are to be sent.
- 4. The report is to be prepared within the time agreed with the solicitor which in most cases would be within 4 weeks of receipt of instructions.
- 5. The expert should have the benefit of the client's statement, a detailed chronology (prepared by the solicitor/in-house para-medical) and paginated core medical notes.
- 6. The expert should have the option of being able to contact the solicitor for further information.
- 7. The Screening Report should not be regarded as disposable. It should be headed "Screening Report Disclosable only to the client and her legal advisors".
- 8. The Screening Report is to include points/issues that require investigation and therefore need a full report. It should comment on areas of possible negligence and the important issues on causation.
- 9. The expert should indicate whether or not his/her speciality is appropriate and whether or not a further expert is required.
- 10. The expert should indicate, at the end of the report, his/her availability to discuss the content of the report with the solicitor on the telephone.
- 11. The fee for the Screening Report needs to be agreed at the time of instruction. The fee for a screening report is usually between £250 £350, plus VAT, depending on

the speciality involved. The fee includes a review of the chronology and paginated core medical notes and a telephone discussion with the solicitor on receipt of the report. This further clarification should be limited to the evidence supplied with the initial instructions unless an additional fee is agreed.
